

Worth, Texas for our 11th Annual Scholarly Seminar, November 15-16, 2019. The Texas Civil War Museum in Fort Worth, Texas for our 11th Annual Scholarly Seminar, November 15-16, 2019. The Texas Civil War Museum is famous for its outstanding collection of both Confederate and Union artifacts and also for its lovely collection of 19th century dresses. We will begin our "congregation" with an "Iced Tea and Cakes" reception at the Museum Friday evening. On Saturday, for our 11th Scholarly Seminar, we will enjoy the hospitality of the Norri Bible Center, which is next door to the Museum.

Our theme this year is "Giants of the Texas Confederacy." Dr. Rick McCaslin will speak on two prominent Texans who were with President Jefferson Davis "to the bitter end." Both of these men had illustrious careers in Texas and in the Confederacy. John H. Reagan was Postmaster General of the CSA, and after the war went on to serve in the U.S. Congress. Francis R. Lubbock was Governor of Texas 1861-63, then served on Davis' staff.

We will be celebrating, with Dr. David Gracy, the publication of his long-awaited biography of George W. Little-field, who never forgot his service with Terry's Texas Rangers and after the war did so much to memorialize the achievements of Texans during the war. Not only did he see the Terry's Texas Rangers statue erected on the Capi tol Grounds, but he also made possible the "final push" to complete the Hood's Brigade monument there.

It is crucial that young scholars be recognized and encouraged, and Joseph Ricci, a graduate student at Southeast ern Louisiana University and a docent at New Orleans' Memorial Hall, will speak on John Bell Hood. Finally, w all know that the ordinary soldier in the ranks (let's not use the word "common") was also a "Giant of the Confederacy" and John Stevens will demonstrate through the letters of the Watts Boys what price the citizen soldier

OCTOBER HISTORICAL PROGRAM "AVERAGE TWO SCARS TO THE MAN" BY JOHN STEVENS




This month's historical program, "Average Two Scars To The Man", was presented by compatriot John Stevens. There were 3 families named Watts who migrated from South Carolina to Anderson County in the 1850's. Several sons of these families of Anderson County served in various units, but 4 enlisted in the 1st Texas. Using 7 unpublished letters written to his ancestors, from members of the Watts family, and extensive research, John Stevens gave a power point presentation that followed these men through their service in Hood's Brigade. Of the 4, only 1 was in active service with his regiment at Appomattox.


Elizabeth White Gathings of Hill County, Texas was a second cousin to the head of these three Watts families. Various members of the Watts families wrote seven letters to Elizabeth and her husband Philip in Hill County, Texas. Based on these letters, online research from several sources, and books written by historians, this program has been assembled to tell the story of four young men named **Watts** who served in Company "G" of the 1st Texas Infantry. John's program followed them and other family members through the War for Southern Independence.











OCTOBER HISTORICAL PROGRAM AVERAGE TWO SCARS TO THE MAN BY JOHN STEVENS



JOHN RUFUS WATTS

- Willis J. Watts was a witness on the pension of his first cousin Cpl. John Rufus Watts - 7th South Carolina Cavalry, Co. "I"
- Gen Martin Gary's Brigade of Cavalry fought in close proximity the Texans until the close of the war



MAY 12, 1865

- John Fletcher Watts letter to Philip Gathings, in part describing family members in service.
- "Brother Julius lost his right arm in the battle of Sharpsburg, he is now at home, clerk of the county court. Frank Watts and John Watts are both dead. Frank died in Va. and John in La. Willis is well and said to be the stoutest man in his Regiment. Sandy, poor fellow, has been shot nearly to death two or three times, and crippled for life."

NOVEMBER 24 & 25, 1865

Two letters written 7 days after the youngest son of Alex Watts returned home from the war.

"..... their kindness to my soldier boys, but for which, they might have suffered greatly & perhaps died in a distant land."

"I came through safe, sound and unwhipped, although I lost all but honor during the war"




A GREAT WAY TO ENSURE THAT YOUR ANCESTOR'S SERVICE AND HONOR IS NOT FORGOTTEN



October 4 - On this day in 1862, on the second day of the battle of Corinth, Mississippi, Confederate General Earl Van Dorn called for a series of headlong frontal attacks against a heavily fortified federal position. Col. William Peleg Rogers of the Second Texas Infantry was ordered to lead the vanguard of the assault on Battery Robinett, a small fort anchoring the center of the Union line. After one bloody repulse, Rogers led a second desperate charge. Remaining on horseback in the face of a barrage of cannon and musket fire, and finally carrying the regimental colors himself, Rogers reached the deep trench fronting Battery Robinett, dismounted, and led several hundred Texans and Alabamans down into the trench, up the steep embankment, and into the fort. Suddenly federal reinforcements closed in from both flanks. Rogers shouted, "Men, save yourselves or sell your lives as dearly as possible." A few seconds later he was struck by multiple rifle shots and died instantly. Scores of others fell with him, and the battle soon ended. The Second Texas Infantry had lost more than half its numbers in casualties. The failure of Rogers's attack sealed Van Dorn's defeat at Corinth. In a remarkable tribute to Rogers's personal bravery, Union general William S. Rosecrans ordered his burial attended with full military honors, a ceremony normally reserved only for Confederate general officers.

Oct 8 - John H. Reagan's Birthday. (He was born in 1818 & passed away March 6, 1905).

Oct 12 - On this day in 1870, Robert E. Lee passed away.

October 23 - On this day in 1863, the First Texas Cavalry, USA, left New Orleans for South Texas as part of the Union effort to interdict the lucrative trade between Confederate Texas and Mexico. The First was one of two regiments of Unionist cavalry from Texas to serve in the Civil War; the Second was formed in Brownsville after the Rio Grande campaign got underway. Loyalty to the Union was anything but a major consensus in Texas during the Civil War. A total of 1,915 Texas men served the Union cause, in contrast to the many thousands who served the Confederacy. Brownsville was a center of Unionist sentiment. Significant numbers of civilians who supported the North fled to the lower Rio Grande, where a provisional state government was set up under Andrew J. Hamilton, and where Edmund J. Davis and others recruited cavalrymen for the North. Davis had formed the First Texas Cavalry, USA, in New Orleans in 1862. In November 1864 the regiment was merged with the Second into the First Texas Volunteer Cavalry. This new twelve-company regiment engaged in patrolling and reconnaissance duties until the end of the war, and was mustered out of service on November 4, 1865.




CONFEDERATE VETERANS MEMORIAL PLAZA INFORMATION

The citizen-soldiers who fought for the Confederacy personified the best qualities of America. The preservation of liberty and freedom was the motivating factor in the South's decision to fight the *Second American Revolution*. The tenacity with which Confederate soldiers fought underscored their belief in the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. These attributes are the underpinning of our democratic society and represent the foundation on which this nation was built.

Today, the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is preserving the history and legacy of these heroes, so future generations can understand the motives that animated the Southern Cause.

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans, and the oldest hereditary organization for male descendants of Confederate soldiers. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved.

Membership in the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either **lineal or collateral** family lines and kinship to a veteran must be **documented genealogically**. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership. **Friends of the SCV** memberships are available as well to those who are committed to upholding our charge, but do not have the Confederate ancestry.
