
The October 8th John H. Reagan Birthday Memorial Ceremony hosted by the Davis-Reagan Chapter 2292 UDC was a very nicely put together program thanks to Mrs. Dollye Jeffus, President of the chapter. I very much appreciate all of you Reagan Camp members who participated in the ceremony and Adjt. Dan Dyer, who is also director at the Museum for East Texas Culture which provided historical pieces from Reagan's home, Fort Houston, at the ceremony.

I am very appreciative of the Palestine Area Veterans organizations including the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Vietnam Veterans of America, the Disabled American Veterans and the American Legion for inviting our camp to participate in the Palestine Veterans Day Parade on Saturday November 12th. The organizers asked that we march with only Confederate flags to represent CSA veterans and the VVA color guard will be marching with the U.S. and Texas flags at the head of the parade. This is a wonderful opportunity for our camp to participate in to honor all American Veterans including the Confederate Veterans.

2012 Camp Officer elections will be held during our November 12th regular meeting. Please plan to attend for the elections, a great historical program and a wonderful meal planned by our Ladies of the Reagan Camp.

The John H. Reagan Camp is honored to be hosting a grave marker dedication for Pvt. Egbert B. Beall, 12th Texas Light Artillery, Val Verde Battery at the Old Zion Cemetery near Donie, Texas on Saturday December 3rd at 11:00 am. Pvt. Beall enlisted in the 5th Texas Cavalry in August of 1861 and went to New Mexico where the Confederates won the Battle of Val Verde capturing the famous cannons of the battery that was formed when they arrived back at Fort Bliss Texas. Pvt. Beall was one of those first members in the Val Verde Battery and he served with the Battery throughout the War until the very end. We will be assisted in the ceremony by the Halbert Camp in Corsicana and the Johnson-Sayers-Nettles Camp in Teague.

It seems that at almost every turn in defending our Confederate ancestors honor these days we are confronted with the untrue Yankee revisionist version of the War for Southern Independence and especially when it comes to slavery. Let us thoroughly educate ourselves on all of the issues our ancestors faced at the time. 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
(continued from page 1) When it comes to the slavery issue, let us view it from the context in which those Southerners lived, by reading primary sources and what God's Holy Word says about it. Once educated with the true facts about antebellum slavery and how and to what degree it related to why the first seven CSA states seceded, you will be much more prepared for dialogue on this topic. 


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The Battle for Lake Hubbard October 22-23, 2011 Hubbard, Texas

The citizen-soldiers who fought for the Confederacy personified the best qualities of America. The preservation of liberty and freedom was the motivating factor in the South's decision to fight the *Second American Revolution*. The tenacity with which Confederate soldiers fought underscored their belief in the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. These attributes are the underpinning of our democratic society and represent the foundation on which this nation was built.

Today, the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is preserving the history and legacy of these heroes, so future generations can understand the motives that animated the Southern Cause.

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans, and the oldest hereditary organization for male descendents of Confederate soldiers. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved.

Membership in the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either **lineal or collateral** family lines and kinship to a veteran must be **documented genealogically**. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership. **Friends of the SCV** memberships are available as well to those who are committed to upholding our charge, but do not have the Confederate ancestry.
